Courses in the Bible Division prepare students to deal with foundational issues of life as well as give those who major in one of the Bible, Religion and Ministry majors, excellent preparation for further study or vocational Christian ministry in a wide variety of areas.

Teaching from a strong biblical perspective, the courses are designed to construct a Christian worldview based on Scripture and guide the student in developing spiritual disciplines for life. Students receive a foundational understanding of Scripture along with the tools necessary to study and apply Scripture for themselves.

The variety of majors and minors in the Bible Division give students an opportunity to design a program which fits their needs and expectations for the future. Majors in Ancient Languages, Bible, and Religion provide excellent preparation for seminary or other postgraduate training. Other majors (i.e., Youth Ministry, Christian Education, and Bible) are designed to develop ministry skills for a variety of age groups and Christian ministries both domestically and internationally.

Bachelor of Arts Degree

The Bachelor of Arts degree has several majors each of which may serve as a foundation for seminary training or other graduate studies. Bachelor of Science

The aims of the Bachelor of Science majors are to bring the student to a comprehensive understanding of the Bible as whole, to achieve reasonable competency in independent Bible study, and to develop skills in the communication and ministry of the Word of God.

It is designed for students choosing upon graduation to enter staff ministries such as youth pastors, assistant pastors, Christian education directors, Christian camp directors, missionary service or student ministries. The Pastoral Studies major is structured to provide training for those older students who desire to enter the pastorate but who, because of age, are not able to pursue a seminary degree.

The degree may also be elected by pre-seminarians who prefer a more extensive base of biblical studies than that offered in the B.A. majors or who desire to work in Christian ministry while pursuing further education.

These majors can lead to licensure, ordination or commissioning for Christian ministry by the student's church constituencies.

Associate of Religious Education (A.R.E.)

The Associate Degree in Religious Education is designed for those who are preparing for supportive roles in ministry or for those who envision further training in non-ministry vocations.

General Education Core requirements for the A.R.E. are listed in the Degree Information section. (See page 65.)

NOTE: A specially designed A.R.E. degree that includes appropriate missions courses is available for prospective missionary pilots. Ground school and flight instruction would be taken independently.

Graduation Requirements

To be eligible for the A.R.E. degree, students must have:

- 64 credit hours, including the prescribed hours.
- A cumulative grade point average of 2.00 or higher in all work, and 2.5 or higher in Bible and theology.
- A mark of "C-" or better in ENG 113 and COM 111.
- Residency for at least 24 hours, and residency in 24 of the last 33 hours.
- Christian Service and chapel attendance requirements as outlined in Student Handbook.
- Written application for graduation to the Registrar's Office, filed no later than April 15 of the academic year prior to that in which the student expects to graduate.

HEB 490 Independent Studies in Hebrew 1-3/6
Consult with Division Chair and instructor in Hebrew concerning possible studies.

CHRISTIAN MINISTRIES

CMI 211 Educational Ministry of the Church 3/1
A preliminary examination of the history and theology as well as the functions of local church education. Emphasizes the dynamics of personal spiritual growth and local church nurture. Introduces basic skills of reasoning, cognitive and moral development, and basic teaching principles.

CMI 212 Foundations of Local Church Youth Ministry 3/2
A study of biblical principles in establishing and maintaining a foundation for local church youth ministry. Students will construct their own philosophy based upon these principles. Special emphasis will be given to a strategic process of implementation.

CMI 213 Introduction to Youth Ministry 3/1
Investigates the characteristics of today's youth in society, the home, church and school with an emphasis on their needs and developmental stages. This course places special emphasis on ministries to youth in today's world through church and para-church organization.

CMI 311 Evangelism and Discipleship 3/2
Designed to guide the student in the development of a personal commitment to and involvement in evangelism and discipleship ministries. Integrates New Testament principles with varied techniques for a practical orientation.

CMI 321 Camp Philosophy and Administration 3/4
Basic administration, philosophy, and methodology of Christian camping with emphasis on principles of decentralization. Attention to objectives, staff personnel, campsite, equipment, facilities, problem-solving, and evaluation. Offered alternate fall semesters.

CMI 325 Homiletics 3/4
Relates the inductive method of Bible study to biblical exposition. Emphasizes adoption of textual analysis for preaching and provides limited opportunity for message presentation. Offered alternate fall semesters.

- CMI 331 Educational Ministries with Children** 3/4
A survey of childhood Christian education in the home and church as well as the Christian school. Discusses parent education, child development, Christian nurture, and instructional methodology from historical, theological, and practical perspectives. Prerequisite: CMI 211.
- CMI 332 Educational Ministries with Youth** 3/4
Investigates the needs and developmental stages of youth in regard to Christian education in the home, church and school. Places special emphasis on techniques of reaching and motivating this age group. Prerequisite: CMI 211.
- CMI 333 Educational Ministries with Adults** 3/4
Specializes in dealing with the nurturing of adults in the development of Christlikeness and local church ministry. Investigates life roles, vocation, and church body functions in depth and presents methods of discipleship as well as contemporary institutional forms. Prerequisite: CMI 211.
- CMI 334 Adolescent Spirituality in Youth Culture** 3/2
Provides a biblical foundation for spiritual development within the teen years. Special consideration is given to current human developmental theories and how they connect and conflict with biblical data. Prerequisite: CMI 332
- CMI 335 Ministering to Adolescents through Small Groups** 2/4
A study of the biblical foundation for small groups and their value as a nurturing tool in the life of adolescents.
- CMI 336 Leadership, Shepherding & Administration of Youth Ministry** 3/2
An examination of biblical leadership as it relates to the youth worker in a local church or Christian organization. The emphasis on leadership and shepherding will include such issues as personal character, styles of leadership, vision, and the development of adult and student leaders. The focus on administration will cover issues including finances, correspondence, conducting meetings, and planning events.
- CMI 341 Family Centered Youth Ministry** 3/4
This course will discuss youth ministry in the context of a Biblical theology of the family. A comprehensive look at family issues along with parenting skills will be addressed from a local church ministry perspective.
- CMI 343 Junior High Ministry** 2/4
A study of the early teen years along with what makes effective ministry. Special topics will include: evangelizing and teaching junior high students; relational needs; and involving junior high students in ministry.
- CMI 380 Internship** 1 - 6 /1
Practical work experience under supervision in the area of the student's chosen ministry emphasis. Practical work experience under supervision in Youth/Counseling or Youth/Education majors in the B.A. program.

- CMI 412 Dynamics of Church Growth** 3/4
Theology, theory, and practice of worldwide church growth. Case studies are discussed.
- CMI 414 Youth Evangelism** 3/4
Building on a relational incarnational model, the biblical imperative of evangelism is discussed. Topics include: What is the Gospel? How to win youth to Christ. How to strategically plan for the evangelism of youth using traditional and non-traditional means.
- CMI 415 Missionary Area Studies** 3/4
These studies concentrate on both historical and current developments in the political, economical, educational, cultural, and religious aspects of life. Gives attention to missionary opportunities in each area: Africa, Asia, Latin America, Europe and North America.
- CMI 416 Philosophy and Development of Youth Ministries** 3/4
The development and implementation of a comprehensive youth ministry that is based on a biblical, sociological and familial model. The framework of the course will provide information, method, and case studies to help facilitate the development of programs that will shape youth culture according to a Christian worldview that is biblical, ethical, and moral. Offered alternate fall semesters.
- CMI 432 Cross-Cultural Ministries to Youth** 3/4
A study of the philosophy, principles and strategies for cross-cultural ministries. Students will discuss strategies, principles and participate in a CCM trip. Prerequisite: CMI 414
- CMI 433 Principles of Leadership and Administration** 3/4
A study of the basic principles of organization and administration including such areas as decision-making, delegating, overcoming resistance to change, and long-range planning. Includes an extensive study of the issues and problems of Christian education that face those involved in its administration.
- CMI 441 Pastoral Ministry and Administration** 3/4
A study of the pastor's responsibility as an administrator and as a shepherd of the local church. Emphasis will be placed upon the administrative duties of a pastor. Skills will be developed in the performance of the pastoral duties in relationship to individuals, the church and the community.
- CMI 442 Pastoral Counseling of Youth** 2/3
A study of the characteristics of short term pastoral, biblical counseling as well as a look at the emotional, social and physical problems youth encounter. This course addresses methods of interaction with the teens and their environment.
Prerequisite: CMI 334

CMI 462 Senior Seminar 2/2
The Bible Division Senior Seminar is intended to provide an informal setting in which divisional majors can participate in a capstone experience that puts into perspective various issues dealing with vocational ministry. The members of the seminar will interact with the professor, as well as with one another, on topics related to ministry in a postmodern world. The goal of the seminar is to produce an esprit de corps within the community of ministry students, and to educate us in terms of what is "out there," with the purpose of enhancing the possibilities of Christian ministry.

CMI 470 Readings in Christian Ministries 1 - 3/1
Guided readings and reports in the student's area of interest and need.

CMI 480 Advanced Topics Seminar 3/6
Formal class dependent upon student demand and interest of the professor. May deal with particular Christian ministries or church educational methodology, philosophy, or problem.

CMI 490 Independent Study 3 - 6/1
Consult with division chair and instructor in Christian ministries concerning possible studies.

MUS 334 Music and Worship 3/4
A study of the theological bases of both music and worship in the church and the application of those premises to corporate worship. Includes the development of a theology of worship, the examination of historical and contemporary liturgies and musical practices, and the development of the ability to reflect well-reasoned theological premises through choices and use of music for public worship. Prerequisite: CMI 212

RELIGION

REL 100 Christian Foundations I 3/1
Christian Foundations I provides the student with a Biblical framework for living in today's world. After establishing basic worldview questions, the course leads the student into a study of Scripture to find answers to these life issues. In the first course the student will understand and practice the principles of inductive Bible study in a study the Old Testament. In the second course, the student will continue to answer worldview questions and practice inductive Bible study while studying the inter-testament period and the New Testament. The course will culminate with the student applying the course content and principles in addressing transformational issues and answering the questions of worldview.

REL 101 Christian Foundations II 3/1
Christian Foundations II continues the purposes of Christian Foundations I, to integrate a Christian worldview with inductive Bible study and Scripture. In this course, the student will continue to answer worldview questions and practice inductive Bible study while studying the inter-testament period and the New Testament. The course will culminate with the student applying the course content and principles in addressing transformational issues and answering the questions of worldview. Prerequisite: REL 100

REL 111 Old Testament Biblical Literature 3/1
The historical background, theme development and doctrinal contribution of each book, considered in a sequence through the entire Old Testament.

REL 112 New Testament Biblical Literature 3/1
Continuation of approach in REL 111.

Survey Courses (31X, 41X)

REL 312 Contemporary Occultism 3/4
A study of the biblio-historical development of the occult as it centers in demonology. Analysis of the current manifestations of occultism in the world, and the methods of dealing with the occult. Includes a study of the New Age Movement.

REL 313 Religion in America 3/4
An overview of the history of American Christianity. Concentrates on Roman Catholicism, primary Protestant denominations, and indigenous cults via a social historical approach that includes the analysis of primary theological tenets and distinctives as well as ecclesiological structure.

REL 317 World Religions I 3/4
A history and analysis of the major Far Eastern religions with special emphasis on Hinduism and Buddhism. Offered alternate fall semesters.

REL 318 World Religions II 3/4
A study of the history and theology of Judaism and Islam with a special emphasis on the development of thought from the Talmud to Zionism and the teachings of the Koran. Offered alternate fall semesters.

REL 412 History and Religions of the Ancient Near East (HIS 432) 3/4
Examines the geo-political framework of the Near East from 3,500-323 B.C., including Semitic peoples such as the Babylonians, Assyrians, Arameans, and Hebrews as well as the Semite's neighbors, such as the Egyptians, Hittites, and Persians. Special attention is given to their religions and to major cultural developments. Introductory matters for historical and religious inquiry into the materials of the time and region are also covered. Prerequisite: Junior standing or professor's permission.

Methodology Courses (22X, 32X)

REL 227 Inductive Exegesis 3/1
A study of the language principles necessary for understanding the Christian scriptures, which are ancient, cross-cultural, translated literature. Passages from several genres are examined in learning to determine what the ancient authors originally intended and how they speak today. May focus on a particular book: REL 223 John, REL 224 Romans, REL 225 Hebrews.

REL 322 Biblical Criticism 3/4
A study of the methods and results of textual and higher criticism from the perspective of biblical inerrancy. Prerequisite: Junior standing. Offered alternate fall semesters.

REL 325 Hermeneutics 3/2
An advanced interpretation course that assumes the knowledge of the material covered in inductive Bible studies. This course applies the inductive method to the various types of biblical literature, carefully considering rules of interpretation essential to a proper understanding of those types of literature. Emphasizes principles of interpretation and provides time to apply such principles and methods to personal understanding of Scripture. Required of all Bible majors. Prerequisite: An inductive Bible study or Christian Foundations I and II.

REL 331 Christian Ethics 3/2
Delineation of a theistic ethic for social and cultural issues of our society as well as ethical dimensions of particular vocations such as business, education, humanities and science. Prerequisites: PHI 211, Rel 321, and junior standing. This course is not part of Biblical Literature courses listed elsewhere in the catalog as REL 33X.

Literature Courses (33X, 43X)

These courses are designed to provide an in depth synthesis of a given portion of the Scriptures. They are intended for: Bible majors and minors Liberal arts students who desire Bible course electives Religion majors who include Bible in the electives of their major. Prerequisite: An Inductive Bible Study or Christian Foundations I and II.

REL 330 Mosaic Literature 3/2
A study of the history of redemption from Adam to Moses as set forth in the Pentateuch. Special attention is given to God's purposes in the call of Abraham and the establishment of the Mosaic economy.

REL 333 Wisdom Literature 3/4
An analysis of the form and content of the poetic books from Job to the Song of Solomon with special emphasis on the theological, devotional, and ethical themes that reveal the inner spiritual life of the Old Testament believer. Offered alternate spring semesters.

REL 334 Prophetic Literature 3/4
An analysis of the form and content of the Old Testament prophets. The course gives an overview of the history of Israel from the divided monarchy to the post-exilic period, and an overview of the office and function of the prophet. Representative books from different eras are selected for analysis emphasizing interpretive methodology, prophetic theology and making presentations of prophetic material. Offered alternate spring semesters.

REL 335 Pauline Literature 3/2
An analysis of the writings of Paul for the purposes of constructing a Pauline theology on such doctrines as man, redemption, incarnation, the church, and last things.

REL 336 General Epistolary Literature 3/4
A synthetic study of the General Epistles from Hebrews through Jude. Places particular emphasis on the ethical contributions of James and the basic motifs of the Johannine and Petrine epistles. Offered alternate spring semesters.

REL 337 Revelation 3/4
An analysis of the Book of Revelation with emphasis on interpretive methodology and the implication of the church of the events foretold in Revelation, from a pre-millennial standpoint. Offered alternate fall semesters.

REL 339 Gospel Literature 3/2
A study of the four Gospels, including their backgrounds, themes, outlines and distinguishing features, and distinctive portraits of Christ, as well as a study of the life and ministry of Christ as set forth in the Gospel of Mark.

Analysis Seminars

These courses are built upon both Inductive Bible Study and the Biblical Literature courses. The seminars aim to develop the student's ability to grasp the textual content and application of any book of the Bible. Emphasis is on the analytical and textual work of the student supplemented by the insight of the professor. Prerequisite: REL 325 or 22X, Inductive Exegesis

REL 438 Romans (Offered alternate spring semesters) 3/4

REL 439 Hebrews (Offered alternate spring semesters) 3/4

REL 342 Philosophy of Religion 3/4
An analysis of the major philosophical problems of religion in the twentieth century. Emphasis is placed on the problem of religious knowledge in relation to faith and reason, traditional arguments for the existence of God, and contemporary difficulties of religious language and verification. Prerequisite: PHI 211. Offered alternate fall semesters.

REL 343 World Mission of the Church 3/2
A study of the philosophy of Christian world missions as it relates to the local church and the world. Addresses issues such as ethnic and urban evangelization, gospel contextualization, and unreached peoples both at home and abroad.

REL 441 Apologetics 3/4
Emphasizes issues of religious epistemology that must be considered in any philosophical and factual defense of the Christian faith. Emphasis will be put on a balanced and eclectic approach that stresses both faith and reason, both presuppositions and facts, both philosophy and history. Prerequisite: PHI 211. Offered alternate fall semesters.

Theology Courses (35X)

REL 352 Christian Theology 3/1
A survey of the primary teachings of Christianity. Taught from a practical viewpoint, the course is designed to aid the junior level student in his/her development of a Christian philosophy of life based on the great truths of the Bible. Offered only in fall. Prerequisites: Junior standing, PHI 211.

REL 354 Theology I 3/2
A Biblical, historical, and systematic statement and study of the doctrines of theological truths of the Christian faith for those contemplating vocational ministry upon college graduation. Fall semester studies bibliology, theology proper, anthropology, and Christology. Prerequisites: Junior standing, PHI 211.

REL 356 Theology II 3/2
A continuation of Theology I in methodology with concentration on the doctrines of Pneumatology, Soteriology, Ecclesiology, and Eschatology. Prerequisites: Junior standing, PHI 211.

REL 357 Old Testament History and Theology 3/2
A study of the periods of Israel's history from the Patriarchs to the Restoration in relation to the surrounding nations of the Near East and the unfolding theological revelation of these periods centered in the Abrahamic Covenant, the Mosaic institutions, Israel's response of apostasy and formalism, and the prophetic reactions to that defection. Prerequisite: REL 100 or REL 330 may be taken concurrently.

REL 358 New Testament History and Theology 3/2
The inter-testamental period is considered in its historical development as a bridge to the New Testament era. The New Testament is set in its historical, political, cultural, social, economic and religious environments. Considers the major biblical theological themes that emerge from the New Testament in their historical development and presentation. Prerequisite: REL 101, 112 or REL 339 may be taken concurrently.

REL 380 Internship 1-6/1
This course is required of Ancient Language, Interdisciplinary Studies and Religion majors in one of two formats: internship with various ministry possibilities, primarily churches; or field study, including trips to significant places of religious practice, interviews of clergy of different religions, attendance at religious conferences sponsored by colleges, universities, interfaith dialogue groups, and others. Field study participants will be expected to share their study in a public forum that is deemed appropriate to the campus community.

REL 470 Readings in Religion or Biblical Studies 1-3/1
Guided readings and reports in the student's areas of interest and need.

REL 480 Advanced Topics Seminar 3/6
Formal class dependent upon student demand and interest of the professor. May deal with particular issues of Christian theology, religious epistemology, modern religious thought, or the writings of a particular theologian or religious thinker. May deal with a particular biblical book or issues of interpretation and methodology.

REL 490 Independent Studies 3-6/1
Consult with division chair in religion concerning possible studies. The following courses are applicable to the area of religion: HIS 432, PHI 451, PHI 452, SOC 353, SOC 422.
